SRJC Late Winter Maintenance Checklist (Also to be used in your garden)

Oak saplings - remove:

• Carefully pull so as to not leave root

Non Native Grasses and weeds:

- Clean up gardens of invasive weeds and non- native grasses like pea and clover **Irrigation Check**:
 - Run grid irrigation and check for leaks and coverage adjust as needed
 - Change the timer for spring to 2 x per week for a deep soak (what is deep soak?
 When the soil is wet to a depth of 1.5 feet

Cut back bunch grasses (Best in December):

• It is almost too late in March to cut native grasses back to 4-6" - this is the one and only plant group to prune into a ball

Clean out rainwater systems like swales and infiltration basins:

 Now is a good time to make sure the leaf litter hasn't built up in your swales, rain gardens and basins

Prune for firewise landscapes:

- Clean up Manzanitas (Arctostaphylos spp) for form by clearing out any dead branches and opening up to set off bark
- Cut back Coyote Brush (Baccharis pilularis and species) hard if becoming woody, this should also be done before nesting season in December or January
- Prune for tidying and separate plant species if becoming overgrown (Salvia, Ceanothus, Baccharis)

Last chance for planting natives:

- With the limited rain this year we will plant some "No-Mow" native grass at the Fire-safer strategies garden.
- This is a good time to plant Salvia species because they don't like wet cold conditions after planting
- Sometimes the plants are only available now until summer in the nursery so you
 will need to purchase them over the summer, keep them watered and plant in the
 late fall

Tools for the job: hand pruners, trowels, spade shovels, gloves, shearers, trench shovels
